STEM programming incorporated:

- YMCA STEM Funded by Battelle: Experimented with Nitrogen and explored what makes a cloud.
- Be W.I.S.E: High school & college volunteers interested in the field of science brought STEM to our afterschool and camp programs. Kids experimented with different activity themes in Robotics, Astronomy, Anthropology, Animal Science and Engineering.
- Archaeology, Can You Dig It?:
 Students excavate actual artifacts as archaeologists would—on a smaller scale, using classroom-friendly dig and grid pits.





PARTICIPANT DEMOGRAPHICS | YMCA EARLY LEARNING CENTERS & PRESCHOOL


Total Early Learning Enrollment by Gender

2023 Calendar Year




Total Early Learning Enrollment by Age









SPRING 2023 RESULTS OF YOUTH SURVEY

Hello Insight (HI) Elementary SEL survey measures four SEL capacities; Master Orientation, Self-Management, Social Skills and Academic Self-Efficacy.

Of the young people surveyed,

87% succeeded in at least one &

68% succeeded in at least two SEL capacities

Included in the survey were youth, ages 8-11, attending YMCA Before & Afterschool programs.

Young people who are Emerging

in a capacity are scoring low when compared to others in the Hello Insight dataset. However, these young people also have the greatest potential for growth, typically showing significant and meaningful growth by the post survey.

Young people who are Advanced

in a capacity are scoring higher when compared to others. These young people have less room for growth, typically showing incremental growth or staying advanced by the post survey.

Core SEL summarizes the SEL capacities

that are all interdependent, and positively affect the develop-ment of emotional, cognitive, and behavioral factors in young people's lives. Core SEL is not a simple average of the other five capacities. It is a unique measurement of all of the ques-tions across the capacities. Each set of questions have unique values when it comes to measuring Core SEL.







TANF & SLLP ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS

YMCA TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE TO NEEDY FAMILIES PROGRAMS (TANF)

Franklin County allocates funding to the YMCA through Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) to provide academic intervention throughout the summer and school year for students in low-resourced areas or from schools with low academic performance.

- Students progress was assessed using easyCBM assessments in math operations and reading fluency
- KidzMath and KidzLit surveys were given to measure students attitudes and beliefs towards math at the beginning and end of the year
- Programs incorporated weekly enrichment activities in reading and math based on needs of the students
- During the summer, programs logged campers reading minutes daily

YMCA SUMMER LEARNING LOSS PREVENTION PROGRAM (SLLP)

The SLLP program is for rising 1st-3rd graders below reading grade level that have been referred by their classroom teachers to participate. The SLLP program operates for six weeks during the summer from 8am-4pm, Monday-Thursday Students receive a nutritious breakfast and lunch.

Certified teachers work in small groups with students and focus on the following literacy skills:

- Guided Reading
- Self-selected Reading
- Writing
- Working with words

SOCIAL & EMOTIONAL LEARNING OUTCOMES

DEVEREUX STUDENT STRENGTHS ASSESSMENT (DESSA)

The DESSA subscales are based on the Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning's Integrated Framework to promote intrapersonal interpersonal, and cognitive competence.


As shown in the circle, the CASEL Framework includes five core competencies:

Self-Awareness, Self-Management, Social-Awareness, Relationship Skills, and Responsible Decision Making.

The DESSA aligns to and expands the CASEL Framework by including eight foundational skills:

- 1. Self-Awareness
- 2. Self-Management
- 3. Goal-Directed Behavior
- 4. Social-Awareness
- 5. Relationship Skills
- 6. Personal Responsibility
- 7. Decision Making
- 8. Optimistic Thinking

When a DESSA rating is completed for a student, a Social-Emotional Composite score will be reported as well as a score in each of the eight subscales. The scores will indicate if the student is demonstrating skills that are **Strong, Typical, or in Need** of Instruction. Raters can use this information to design


